

Draft minutes of the 15th Biotrade Stakeholders Forum meeting held virtually on 15th February 2022

1. Virtual Arrival

2. Welcome and Purpose of meeting

The Chairperson welcomed the participants. The Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) agreed to present their National Strategy for indigenous food crops and engagement with academic on food and crop research to the Forum. The department has embarked on the review of the strategy to assess if the objectives and intended programmes are still relevant for the development of the indigenous food crops sector. Thus, the participants of the meeting were invited to provide input, add challenges, possible interventions, identify their potential roles and even identify where potential collaboration with DALRRD could be considered.

The draft agenda was adopted with no changes. A list of attendees and apologies received is given in Appendix 1.

5. Presentations by DALRRD

Moloko Mojapelo, Scientist Production, Directorate Plant Production at the DALRRD presented the national strategy for indigenous food crops review. The following is a summary of the points of the presentation.

- A general introduction to the indigenous food crops in South Africa.
- An overview of the National Strategy for indigenous food crops: the purpose, objectives of the strategy, challenges identified in the sector and proposed intervention measures.
- The progress projects that were implemented as part of the strategy which included: i) production guidelines (developed material) available on the DALRRD www.dalrrd.gov.za>Resource Centre>Brochures; ii) Awareness campaign on the value of indigenous food crops (food, nutrition, and climate change; iii) Research projects commissioned by DALRRD.
- The challenges that faced in the implementation of the strategy and lesson learned.

- An overview of projects that were implemented as part of the strategy.

6. Questions, Comments and Recommendations

- It was suggested/recommended that a list of species of the known indigenous food crops should be included in the strategy and the scientific names be checked and updated. It was indicated that the list of indigenous food crops is available on the website. (see Appendix 2)
- CSIR is working on indigenous leafy vegetables and legumes (cow pea and Bambara nuts) and would like to collaborate on the strategy especially on developing products from these indigenous food crops.
- A question was asked on the process of checking and verifying genetic material from other countries to the national GenBank. If other countries have access to the material in the South African GenBank and the terms to access the material. - The Agricultural Research Council indicated that materials that comes from other countries there are Material Transfer Agreements (MTAs) that are signed.
- SEDA indicated that they offer support in branding and commercialising products into small retail.
- It was suggested that the strategy include a map of the geographic distribution of indigenous food crops in South Africa, but it was indicated that the geographic information is available (see Appendix 2).
- The quality requirements and the importance of the requirements for market access should be included in the strategy as a standalone paragraph.
- The review process of the strategy should include consultation with the private sector.
- It was suggested that the appendix of the strategy includes case studies of the process followed to get the indigenous food crops commercialised.
- The Central University of Technology indicated that they have been working on preservation of indigenous vegetables and product development, they are interested in a collaboration.
- The Ecosystem Development for Small Enterprise Programme (EDSE) offers capacity building on compliance to food safety and quality standards in which the programme upskills SMMEs as well as preparing them for certification of their agroprocessing facilitation. (see Appendix 4)
