

Points raised during the English webinar on the topic: Introduction and overall options to implement ABS *held on 30thApril 2020*

- 1. Points raisedafter the presentation on "GENERAL INTRODUCTION TO THE AFRICAN UNION GUIDELINES FOR THE COORDINATED IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NAGOYA PROTOCOL IN AFRICA" held by Pierre du Plessis
 - Though progress towards the implementation of the Nagoya Protocol (NP) is not often reported on the ABS Clearing House, implementation processes have been initiated and are ongoing in many countries.
 - The AU Guidelines (Guidelines) represent a consensus endorsed by the highest decision-making body of the African Union.
 - Some countries haveused the Guidelines to inform national measures for the implementation of the NPwhile others did not take them into account. We do not have data/ statistics as to how many countries have used the Guidelines during their national implementation processes. Gathering this data would require further investigation.
 - The Guidelines try to build on the flexibilities provided in the NP to better reflect African priorities in implementing the NP.
 - The Guidelines provide a framework that countries can use, adapt and tailor to their national circumstances.
 - The Guidelines include and reflect feedback and inputs from traditional knowledge holders and IPLCs.
 - Visualization of AU guidelines and other approaches will be part of the next webinar.
 - A call was made to encourage more countries to use the Voluntary Peer Review (VPR) process on ABS
- 2. Points raised after the presentation on "Introduction to the ABS Initiative 's discussion paper

ABS Implementation Options" held by Suhel al-Janabi

- The document was presented and discussed at the 12thPan-African ABS Workshop that took place in Cape Town in September 2019. The document has also been disseminated through the ABS News Digest and via the ABS Initiative website.
- The Initiative hopes that the document will continue to be used by a broader audience.
- More detailed discussions about advantages and disadvantages of the proposed options in national circumstances are needed when using the publication during the process of setting up/revising national ABS systems.

- There are specific topics that are not reflected in the document (e.g. endangered species), but that might, according to national circumstances, need a deeper discussion at national level.
- Not every relevant subset of ABS implementation-related topics could be reflected in the document, which is by no means a statement about their merit or relevance. National reflection is needed on a country by country basis.
