



The Rooibos Plant



The home of Rooibos

- Rooibos is endemic to the Cape Floral Kingdom of South Africa which is UNESCO World Heritage Site
- It is the smallest of the six Floral Kingdoms in the world and is the only one contained entirely in a single country.
- It is very biodiverse: 8700 species which makes it one of the richest floras worldwide, surpassing many tropical forest regions
- In SA, over one third of all plant species occur in the Cape Floral Kingdom, even though it occupies less than 6% of the area of the country.




Rooibos is also called Red bush.

Which is really interesting since the brew is red, but the plant that Rooibos comes from is not.



- 'Rooibos' is an herbal infusion from the plant Aspalathus linearis which only grows in the South-Western part of South Africa
- Rooibos is a shrub-like bush which is part of the legume or pea family.
- It grows up to about five feet in height and has a smooth-barked stem from which subdivides close to the surface of the soil followed by delicate side branches each bearing, singly or in clusters, soft, needle-like leaves.





Rooibos only grows in the rugged mountainous areas of the Cederberg region of South Africa, where the winters are cold and summers very hot, which makes it a rare and special plant.

Why a GI for Rooibos?


Rooibos Trademark registered by Forever Young in 1994 – use of word by other parties in the US prohibited – SA Government & Rooibos Ltd won case

In 2013 the French Compagnie de Trucy, attempted to register exclusive use of the word Rooibos in France – SARC filed an objection with the French trademark authority

Not only about protecting the name, but also linking it to the region

Benefits of GI: Protection

- Helps protect the name from misuse and imitation, while allowing Rooibos role players to use it without fear of litigation in foreign markets
- GI's include guidelines for how a product should be produced - ensure all Rooibos is high quality
- Rooibos is produced in a fragile ecosystem, and GI registration will help protect the unique biodiversity of the region




Options for Geographical Indication



Instruments for protection

- Local protection
 - Agricultural Product
 Standards Act
 - Merchandise Marks Act

- EU protection
 - Economic Partnership Agreement
 - EU GI Register



Process for the Economic Partnership Agreement



The development of a Rooibos GI was first approved at the SARC AGM



Apr. 2008

Initial report on the GI Feasibility was published



6 Sep. 2013

Rooibos GI was finally protected under the MMA

Researched as part of the Duras project (joint GFAR-Agropolis International initiative)

2006

Final report on GI Feasibility was published



Southern African Development Community Economic Partnership Agreement



From the EPA to the EU register

- Rooibos not appearing on the EU GI register
- Ability to use PDO status, logo and acronym in all EU languages
- High consumer-recognition of PDO logo
- Direct rather than negotiated right for producers
- Ease of application for further GI protection

Process for submission and approval for the EU Register

21 Aug. 2018

Initial application submitted



6 Aug. 2020

Single Document was published in the Official Journal of the EU for comment



9 Nov. 2020

Resolution submitted to the EU

Three sets up revisions as requested by the EU Commission submitted

29 Apr. 2019, 20 Dec 2019 & 20 Feb. 2020 Meeting with parties who submitted the objections & agreement reached



8 Oct. 2020



Benefits of GI



Benefits of GI: Marketing


- Adds value to Rooibos, and a GI would put more power in the hands of the farmers and producers
- GI links an area to a product, and is a powerful marketing tool for the region and could be used to promote other activities





31 May 2021 'Rooibos' / 'Red Bush' received the honour to be the first product from Africa awarded the coveted status of 'PDO' in the European Union's (EU) Register of Geographical Indications (GI).

Real benefit to the product



June was an exceptional

month due to the
announcement of Rooibos'
inclusion as a PDO GI in the EU.

Additional 76 340kg per month of exported on average after the inclusion in the EU GI Register; an increase of 11,6%.

Lessons learnt



Lessons learnt

- Importance of having an appropriate domestic valorisation system
- Dedicated scheme management function (PPECB)
- Need a credible and inclusive custodian of the GI - strong industry collaboration and/or organization
- Challenges of translating foreign legal prescripts into local product realities knowledge of EU requirements and regulation needed
- Technical institutional support framework as important – identify sources
- Immediate increase in domestic and international interest in Rooibos

Observations for other producers

- Rooibos Industry could directly apply to EU but important to recognise and work through national authorities – opened diplomatic channels which proved very valuable
- Very long and complicated process, the comments and support received from the EU Commission was very valuable.
- Objections should be approached in a positive way. Benefit from years of practical experience & contributions prevented challenges which would only materialise at a later stage.
